IRVINE CONFERENCE ON! Gay student groups "recognized, un-recognized, and fanaticized" are forming a coalition that is putting the fear of God into some college administrators. The coalition scheduled a day-long conference May 27 to be hosted by the Gay Students Union at University of California, Irvine, deep in the heart of ultra-right Orange County.

"Undue publicity and emotional agitation was aroused both on and off campus" last March when the administration banned show-

ing of a male porno film Seven in a Barn, wrote Vice Chancellor John C. Hoy to Terry Oleson, 26, of GSU at UCI.

Because "a volatile climate of opinion [exists] that is potentially explosive," Hoy added, [he] "finds that UCI is not a suitable place at this time for a Southern California conference of gay liberation groups."

But because GSU is an officialtion, the school couldn't deny
GSU permission for a "symposium" with speaker (John Rechy,
author of City of Night) and
workshops. Reports Oleson: Conference is off, "symposium" is on.

same time (9AM).
