"Birds of a Feather Flock Together" and that is how <u>organized LGBTQ law student activism</u> began in 1972. That was the same year the <u>ABA</u> held its first forum on gay rights. To commemorate the 50th anniversary of these historic events, various activities will occur during LGBTQ History Month in October 2022. Commemorative events will encompass the legal activism of an entire decade. A documentary film will recognize law students, law professors, and lawyers who were trailblazers for LGBTQ rights throughout the 1970s. A memory book of essays written by living trailblazers of that era and biographical narratives of those who are deceased will be produced. Participating law schools, student groups, and bar associations will conduct educational forums where the documentary film (30 min.) will be shown, followed by an audience conversation with of one or more of the living trailblazers. Audiences at these forums will receive the memory book. (See 1.5 minute video.)

An Invitation to Participate

Trailblazers. Individuals who were active in LGBTQ activism in the 1970s as law students, law

professors, or practicing lawyers, are invited to participate. We will reach out to you for a zoom interview and ask you for photos or graphic images relevant to your activities during that era. We will invite you to submit an essay to be included in the memory book. We encourage you to participate in one or more forums to be held in October 2022.

Law Schools. Student groups or faculty members at law schools can sponsor an in-person or virtual forum in October 2022 to commemorate the LGBTQ legal activism of the 1970s. After the film is shown, students, faculty, and members of the legal community can have a conversation with one or more of the trailblazers from that era. Participating schools will have display space in the memory book. Schools and student groups may arrange to participate by contacting Thomas F. Coleman. (See next page for contact information.) **Bar Associations.** National, state, and local bar associations can participate by sponsoring a forum in October 2022. The documentary will be made available for showing at an in-person or virtual event that you host. One or more trailblazers will be available for a question and answer session
