

Six law, history, or journalism students will work under the supervision of three attorneys on a project to commemorate LGBTQ legal trailblazers from the 1970s. Trailblazers include law students, law professors and practicing attorneys who were involved in LGBTQ legal activism during that decade.

Each student will contact some of the 38 living trailblazers, inviting them to participate by submitting personal essays, doing a zoom interview, and submitting photos and documents related to their experiences as a trailblazer. Students will research each trailblazer's biographical information and conduct a zoom interview which will later be edited by a film student intern. Each student will also write a biographical narrative of some of the 30 deceased trailblazers from that era and find relevant photos and documents associated with that person to include with the narrative.

The materials gathered and developed by the students will be incorporated into several webinars for students, professors, and lawyers that will occur during LGBTQ History Month (October 2022).

We will also produce a memory book containing the essays of the living trailblazers and the biographical narratives of those who are deceased. The work of the students will be mentioned in the webinars and acknowledged in the memory book.

Internships are sponsored by <u>Spectrum Institute</u> and are open to all students regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity. Although internships officially start in January, students are invited to do some pro bono work in December if they are available.
